## Election 2022

Colorado's election results were better than most even dreamed.


Of the 48 candidates we endorsed for State House, 44 won. Of the 13 candidates we endorsed for State Senate, 11 won. All three of the state board of education candidates we endorsed won and all four of the statewide candidates we endorsed won.

The AFT COPE committee and Executive Board worked to determine endorsements and distribution of donations from the COPE fund. I met with the majority of candidates, either individually or as a part of the education event we held for candidates. The AFT helped tremendously by contributing to campaigns in our state as well.

Below you will see our volunteer stats. Frankly, these numbers fall far short of expectations. We have thousands of members across the state and, while we have a lot to celebrate, I am already

focused on how we can mobilize more of our members and our elected leaders to volunteer next year for school board races and municipal elections, and especially in 2024 for the Presidential election.

Our COPE donations were noticed and appreciated by candidates. Thank you to all the members who donate to COPE. We will be asking everyone to consider donating to COPE so that we can begin building our resources for upcoming elections.



## **Local Union Updates**



### Update from the Douglas County Federation

It's hard to believe that the holidays are upon us and the first semester is coming to a close! To say things have been busy is an understatement. In October our President, Kevin DiPasquale, stepped down and Vice-President, Sarah Mesmer, became the Interim President. This leadership

transition created a perfect opportunity to reflect on our traditional structure and consider a change. Historically we have had a full-time President who is no longer employed by the School District. We have decided to convert to a structure mirroring AFT-Colorado with an Executive Director and a President who remains a District employee.

At our general membership meeting, November 30th, we introduced Lucy Squire as our new DCF President. Lucy is at Copper Mesa Elementary School where she teaches third grade.

"I am excited to step into the role as President of the DCF!" says Squire. "I've spent my 18-year teaching career in Douglas County, which means I've experienced the vast gamut of educational philosophies, leadership styles, and school boards. . . and quite frankly, I think that educators, and those in the field should be the ones making decisions about education; we should be a presence in the room and have a voice when decisions are made. While I know there will be challenges as the DCF President, I am excited and quite optimistic about paving a new path forward by building positive relationships with the school board, while representing and advocating for my incredible colleagues."



"I am also still in the classroom, and this is the first time we've had a current, full-time teacher in this role. While we are working to define what this looks like, I believe that bringing in a current voice to educational matters and decisions is vital."

In November there were two significant measures on the ballot in Douglas County that would impact our members: initiative 5A, a mill-levy override (MLO) that was ear-marked exclusively for employee compensation, and 5B, a bond for building new schools in three, rapidly growing housing developments and for capital improvements at existing buildings. The DCF supported these measures through: phone banking, canvassing, distributing literature, sending text messages encouraging support and surveying members as to their voting intentions, utilizing email and social media to encourage our members to support the measures, publishing information regarding where to obtain yard signs and how to sign up for campaign activities that have been organized by other entities, and car painting. While neither initiative passed, there is a strong probability that they will appear again next year.
