"\$12 by 2020" Minimum Wage Initiative

The skyrocketing cost of living in Colorado is probably no secret to any of you. It has become more and more difficult for working class folks to get by in a time that we have seen income inequality reach historic levels resulting from stagnant wages and an economy that seems to be gamed for corporations and the ultra-rich. This reality doesn't reflect the Colorado values that we should support for strong families and thriving communities.

Luckily, there is some relief in sight for those who are getting hit the hardest. There will be an initiative on this year's ballot that will gradually raise Colorado's minimum wage to \$12 an hour by the year 2020. It may not be as high as other minimum wage laws that have recently been passed elsewhere, but it is a significant relief for hundreds of thousands Coloradans and a huge step in the right direction.

Under our current law, folks working full-time, earning minimum wage, bring home less than \$300 a week. Contrary to what some say, nearly 9 out of 10 minimum wage workers are over the age of 20, and many of them are in skilled jobs like nursing assistants, preschool teachers, EMTs, and caregivers for the elderly and disabled. Currently, over 130,000 hardworking parents in Colorado with full-time jobs live in poverty with their children. This ballot initiative not only brings economic fairness to Colorado, but will also help our economy, not hurt it. When working class people have more money in their pockets, they spend it at local businesses and it will actually create jobs. In other places that have raised their minimum wage, jobs have remained steady or have increased.

Small businesses and organizations like the American Federation of Teachers – Colorado and the Colorado AFL-CIO have endorsed the measure and we urge you to do the same when you receive your ballot this fall. A group called Colorado Families for a Fair Wage is leading this effort and we encourage you to take a look at their website and get=involved by volunteering. Their website is:

2016 Election

This year's election is an incredibly important one for unions and the State of Colorado as a whole. The presidential election certainly has dominated the news, but there are also races on the Congressional level, in the Colorado State House and Senate, and statewide ballot initiatives that will have far-reaching consequences. There are key races around the state that could determine the path of our education system takes moving into the future, and we highly encourage you to vote on every contest and ballot question on this year's ballot.

Before we send you our full list of endorsed candidates and our stances on ballot initiatives, it is critical to emphasize the importance of **voting.**

This year will be the first presidential election in Colorado where every voter will receive a mail-in ballot. So, not only is this year's election one of the most important elections in decades, but it will be one of the easiest in which to vote.

In order to take part in this historical election, you must first ensure you are registered to vote. If you are not sure if you are registered or if your registration is up-to-date, you can simply text the word **Colorado** to **2vote** on your smart phone. You will then be sent a link where you can register and check your registration status. You can also go to **govotecolorado.com** on your computer or smart phone.

Important Voting Information

- You can register to vote up to Election Day, at a voter service and polling center (but register now!)
- If you plan on mailing your ballot, you must affix the appropriate amount of postage to your mail-in ballot (amount varies by county) **OR** you can drop off your ballot at designated drop-off boxes
- If you would like to vote in-person, you can do so at a voter service and polling center, but you must surrender your mail-in ballot at the time you vote (unless you lose your ballot or do not receive a ballot)
- If you do not receive a ballot in the mail by October 24th, and you are certain you are registered to vote at your current address, contact or visit your county clerk's office ASAP
- If you lose or damage your mail-in ballot, you can get a new one at your county clerk's office or at a voter service and polling center **OR** vote in person when voting centers open

Important Dates

- October 17 Mail ballots will begin to be mailed out to voters
- October 24 Voter service and polling centers open
- October 31 Last day to register to vote, if you would like to receive a mail-in ballot
- November 4 Last day to mail your ballot (your ballot must be RECEIVED by your county clerk no later than 7pm on November 8th)
- November 8 ELECTION DAY!! **Ballots must be received no later than 7pm**

Local Union Updates



Resignation of **DCSD** Board Member Doug Benevento

Douglas County Federation members celebrated the news that one of the reform directors would be resigning. The board is now temporarily made up of three pro-public education members, and three reform members. The process to replace Benevento will begin with interviews of candidates who reside in the appropriate region of the county to be followed by a vote by the remaining school board members. If the vote is a tie after several attempts to come to an agreement, the board president will appoint the new member. The position of board president is held by one of the reform members, so the appointment is likely to be another reform member. Nevertheless, members are celebrating this change.



Denver Federation for Paraprofessionals and Nutrition Service Employees

Pay for Performance

The Denver Federation for Paraprofessionals and Nutrition Service Employees negotiated for salary for both chapters. This year the nutrition employees are going to Pay for Performance (which was negotiated in 2014) based on their last school year evaluation.

Denver public schools' cost of living was 1.76% for 2016-2017. We are the only classified group in Colorado paid on the basis of performance.

Paraprofessionals also received a 1.76% COLA. With that money the federation was able to give paras a step on their salary schedule and longevity for paras, with 10 years of service or more, a one-time payment. Paras who were maxed out in steps also received a one-time payment of 1.76% it's a great year for DFPNSE.
