

Update from the Douglas County Federation

The past few months have provided a strong message to our members and those in the education community: a strong union relationship with the school district makes the difference in election results. In the surrounding metro area school districts, almost every school board seat went to propublic education candidates because of union support and collaboration. The Douglas County Federation would like to report out similar results, but that did not happen this year. We know that our strength moving forward will depend on increased and engaged DCF membership. Strengthening our relationships within the community will build back a level of collaboration that puts education at the forefront of the political landscape.

Jason Butler, our AFT Organizer, and I have been visiting members and building relationships before school over the past two months. It has been great connecting with people and learning what successes and challenges this academic year has presented thus far. We have a strong sense of community in many pockets in Douglas County and will continue to branch out to build our membership so this becomes the norm.

While the school board election results are a concern for public schools in Douglas County, we are planning, in partnership with members and community, the steps needed to ensure that progress continues with regard to the Educational Equity Policy, improved compensation, and overall working environment for our members. Education faces many challenges with staffing from not having enough substitutes, support staff, and teachers which creates even further/more strain from the pandemic and political strife. But we will continue to forge on to affect positive changes for the profession.

Over the course of this pandemic, we have seen public opinion shift from a reverence toward public education to admonishments of our hardworking teachers and staff. We know the importance of collaboration and how our organization is made stronger by people working together. While there is a movement working against public education nationwide, employing the same tactics from Virginia to Ohio to Colorado to sow discord in our communities, our work continues. We must build our own membership, rise above the rhetoric, and continue to carry on the work to improve our organization and our local school district. A strong public education gives students a chance for greater success, creates opportunities for members to have a safe workplace and predictable compensation. Most importantly, public education also helps create a strong sense of community that is at the heart of our schools. We will always strive to build bridges-by increasing our membership and ensuring the right of every student to a quality public education in Douglas County.

Lastly, DCF is committed to positively contributing to our community. We are excited to announce that we hosted a successful pediatric vaccination clinic on Friday December 3rd.
